2023 NYSAC Legislative Conference 1 **Standing Committee on Climate Action** 2 **Resolution #3** 3 4 **Resolution Calling Upon the Public Service Commission (PSC) to Authorize** 5 6 Counties to Authorize and Form Community Choice Aggregation (CCA) 7 **Programs** 8 9 WHEREAS, on April 21, 2016, the Public Service Commission (PSC) issued its Order Authorizing Framework for Community Choice Aggregation Opt-Out Program, which 10 authorized the establishment of Community Choice Aggregation (CCA) programs by 11 cities, towns, and villages statewide and articulated the necessary design principles and 12 standards that municipalities must apply in developing and implementing CCA 13 programs for their constituents; and 14 15 16 WHEREAS, CCA programs allow local governments to make bulk power purchases on behalf of participating homes and businesses in their jurisdiction, making it easier for 17 residents and employers to benefit from local clean energy projects; and 18 19 **WHEREAS**, most communities in New York State that have implemented a CCA 20 program procure 100 percent renewable energy as their default supply, which has 21 helped to scale up renewable energy systems and reduce greenhouse gas emissions; and 22 23 WHEREAS, when CCAs integrate opt-out community solar, participating homes and 24 small businesses are enrolled in one or more community solar projects from which they 25 receive credits on their electric bill, which typically guarantee savings of 5 percent to 10 26 percent; and 27 28 WHEREAS, opt-out community solar allows CCAs to enroll hundreds, or even 29 30 thousands, of people at once, significantly reducing soft costs associated with solar and making the economics of renewable energy more attractive; and 31 32 WHEREAS, for the abovementioned reasons, CCAs are tools for transformative 33 change in the way consumers connect to and purchase their energy; and 34 35 36 **WHEREAS**, the transformative potential of CCAs is limited by the Public Service Commission, which, in its 2016 Order, made counties ineligible to create their own 37 CCAs programs; and 38 39 WHEREAS, as a result, county governments have been limited to encouraging 40 municipalities to form an inter-municipal CCA and providing administrative support; 41 42 and 43 WHEREAS, the Climate Action Council's Final Scoping Plan includes a 44 recommendation for PSC to enable county governments to authorize and form CCA 45

- 1 programs in recognition of the important role this could play in speeding up the State's
- 2 transition to clean energy.
- 3 NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, the New York State Association of
- 4 Counties (NYSAC) calls upon the Public Service Commission to authorize counties to
- 5 authorize and form community choice aggregation programs with a local opt-out in
- 6 addition to the cities, towns, and villages that are currently eligible to participate; and
- BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that enabling counties to create CCAs will allow for
- 9 more purchasing power, more affordable rates, and greater renewable energy adoption;10 and
- 11
- BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, NYSAC further supports the Final Scoping Plan's
 recommendation to remove barriers to entry, particularly for lower-income households,
- 14 and include safeguards for energy-burdened households that may have been the target
- 15 of previous predatory practices related to their energy bills and services; and
- 16
- 17 **BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED**, that copies of this resolution be sent to the counties
- 18 of New York encouraging member counties to enact similar resolutions; and
- BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that NYSAC shall forward copies of this resolution to
- 21 Governor Kathy Hochul, the New York State Legislature, PSC Chair and Executive Chief
- 22 Officer Rory M. Christian, and all others deemed necessary and proper.
