

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AFR Modernization

Benefits of Modernizing the AUD

- Web-based application within OSC Online Services
 - Intuitive interface
 - Improved navigation
 - Multiple users able to work on the report
 - Remote access
 - Improved data validation
 - Bulk load of financial data
- All data updates made by local officials

Enacted Budget

- Rejected Executive's CHIPS funding reduction
 - Maintained at \$598m. Counties get \$197m
- County Partnership Grants Program
 - \$85m for public safety equipment
 - \$50m for site development preparation grants
- "Raise the Age" of Juvenile Jurisdiction
 - \$250m appropriation, \$842m reappropriations
- EMS as "Essential Services"
 - Not included in Enacted Budget



EMS agencies are struggling in various ways


- Staffing

The Growing Role of Counties in EMS

We surveyed County EMS Coordinators

- 52 of 57 EMS Coordinators responded.
- 22 counties provide or contract for ambulance service provision
 - None plan to reduce services.
- 11 counties were planning or considering getting involved with providing ambulance services.
- 18 do not provide ambulance services
- 6 did not provide usable responses to survey



Next Steps


- Local governments should continue to monitor situations and conduct needs assessments


Sales Tax First Quarter Collections



- Sales Tax First Quarter Collections
 - Totaled \$5.6 billion, a1.6% (\$87.3m) increase
 - NYC increased 3.2%
 - County collections were down 0.2%
 - 31 of 57 counties saw decreases
 - Impacted by lower inflation levels
