NYSAC Standing Committee on Intergovernmental Affairs 2 **Resolution #4** 3 4 **Resolution Calling on the State of New York to Amend Procurement Related** 5 6 Laws in Order to Make for More Efficient Government 7 8 **WHEREAS**, state procurement laws control the manner by which local governments and public schools buy goods and services from commercial bidders; and 9 10 **WHEREAS**, these statutes exist, in part, to promote transparency and to ensure the 11 proper use of taxpayer dollars; and 12 13 **WHEREAS**, request for proposals (RFP) and competitive public bidding requirements 14 15 were created by the State legislature with the intent of providing transparency while increasing competition in order to lower government costs; and 16 17 WHEREAS, local governments and schools spend billions of dollars annually on 18 purchases of goods and services; and 19 20 **WHEREAS**, the State in recent years has recognized that due to technology changes 21 and increasing public service needs, more procurement flexibility is needed that will 22 23 result in lower government purchasing costs and continuing to protect public interests; and 24 25 26 WHEREAS, some of the recent changes to procurement laws include the ability for local governments and schools to piggyback off existing government contracts, allowing 27cooperative purchasing, and use of a "best value standard"; and 28 29 WHEREAS, these changes have provided our local and state procurement officers with 30 more tools on how to make a purchase, directly resulting in millions of dollars in savings 31 for our taxpayers; and 32 33 **WHEREAS**, while these changes were helpful, goods and services continue to increase 34 in cost and more must be done to drive down expenses on our local government, 35 including the following list of options other states, and our state (just not local 36 governments), are allowed to provide and have proven to be successful in creating 37 38 government efficiency: Increase bid limits (solely based on inflation) commodities \$25,000 and public • 39 works \$45,000, 40 • Ability to mandate electronic response to all bids not governed by Article 8 of the 41 labor law; currently can only mandate electronic response for technology bids, 42 • Ability to receive public works bids electronically, 43 Ability to use reverse auctions as a competitive procurement process, • 44

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Allow for primary and secondary awards on competitive bids; secondary awards
could only be used when the primary awardee cannot deliver due to product
availability or labor availability, and supply chain delays and volatility.

4 5 6 NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, the New York State Association of Counties (NYSAC) calls on the State of New York to make the changes listed above, 7 8 allowing for more flexibility for our counties to make purchases of goods and services, and ensure our residents are getting the most efficient use of their taxpayer dollars; and 9 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that copies of this resolution be sent to the counties 10 of New York encouraging member counties to enact similar resolutions; and 11 12 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that NYSAC shall forward copies of this resolution to 13 Governor Kathy Hochul, the New York State Legislature, and all others deemed 14
